Board of Compensation

Legislative

- Incorporated by a special act of the Quebec National Assembly on June 28, 1978
- Legislatively established as an administrative department of the Cree Nation Government (previously the Cree Regional Authority)
- Exercises all the rights and powers of the Cree Nation Government relating to the portion of the compensation intended for the Cree and contemplated in section 25.1 and 25.2 of the JBNQA
- BOC is to receive in full ownership, administer, use, invest, transfer and distribute the portion of the compensation

 Businesses such as CCDC were created, to be able to benefit from employment opportunities which arose due to the James Bay Project.



AIR CREEBEC BEGINNINGS



It was July 5, 1982 when Air Creebec finally got into the air. The first scheduled flight left from Val-d'Or and travelled to Great Whale, with stops in Matagami, Rupert House, Eastmain, Wemindji and Fort George. A bright orange Twin Otter, the only plane in Air Creebec colours at the time, was used.

The seeds of Air Creebec were planted in 1979 when Austin Airways was eager to expand into Northern Quebec. Stan Deluce, the President of Austin Airways met with Billy Diamond, Grand Chief of the Grand Council of the Crees. Deluce was looking for support from the Crees to take advantage of all the activity connected with the James Bay hydro project. Billy said the Crees were looking at starting their own airline.

Both realized that they needed each other to make their dreams come true.



 EERP's first major real estate re-development project, ODEA Montreal, is well underway.




- Ground-breaking ceremony, invited elder Kevin Deer from Kahnawake






- Received extensive local and national press coverage as the project is the first indigenous majority owned multiuse redevelopment project in Montreal.
